### **UPCOMING EVENTS**

The upcoming session of the [Asia-Pacific Stats Café](#), on **Wednesday, 16 September from 1 to 2 pm (Bangkok time)**, will focus on data integration. Data integration pulls together data from different traditional sources such as censuses, surveys, and administrative data like civil registration, as well as new sources of data. It can provide more frequent, timely and disaggregated statistics, at lower cost compared to traditional approaches. While this is promising, there are challenges on the way, including access to data, quality, interoperability, privacy and confidentiality, and limited technical capacity.
