Strategy 1

Expanding the reach of **Population Registration and Civil Registration services** for all Indonesian Residents and Citizens abroad.



Strategy 2

Increasing awareness and **activeness** of all Indonesian residents and citizens abroad in recording population events and important events.



Strategy 3

Acceleration of ownership of **Population Documents** for vulnerable Population Administration residents and special groups.



Strategy 4

Developing and increasing the **availability of vital statistics** which accurate, complete, and timely for development planning and implementation



Strategy 5

Strengthening **coordination, collaboration, and synchronization** between ministries/ agencies, local governments, and stakeholders.

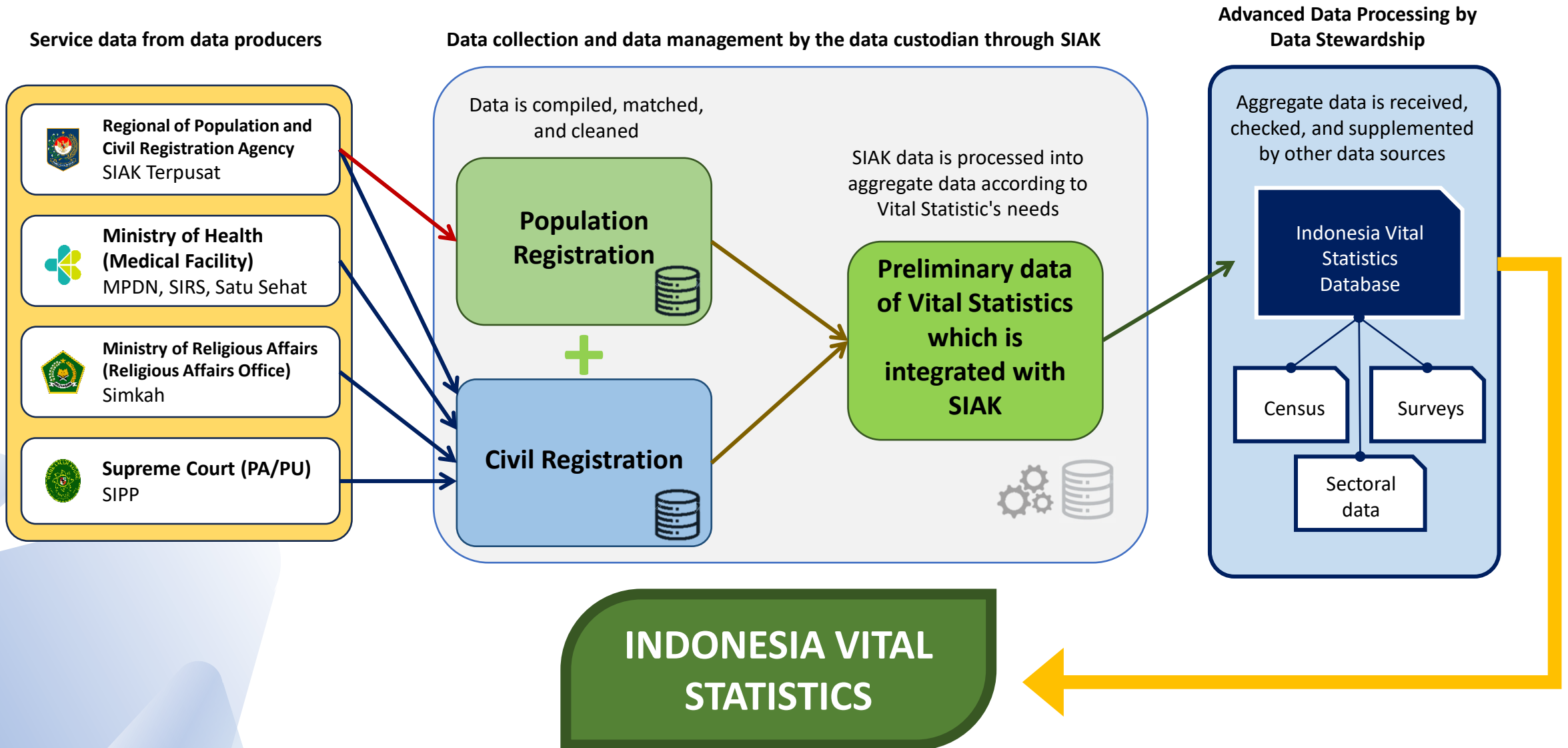

Dissemination Planning of CRVS in 2024

Q1

- **Agreement on Roles and Responsibilities** for the Production of Vital Statistics;
- **Arrangement of a Team** for Production and Compiling Vital Statistics Reports;
- **Technical Guidance** for Producing Vital Statistics.

Q2

- **Determination of the Vital Statistics Production Technical Instructions Module**
- **Technical Guidance** of Producing Vital Statistics

Q3

- **Advanced Technical Guidance** of Producing Vital Statistics
- **Analysis of Vital Statistics Production Data**
- **Primary Draft** of Vital Statistics Production Report

Q4

- **Vital Statistics Report**
- **Process of synchronization and Integration** of Vital Statistics data with other data

Vulnerable Populations

Minister of Home Affairs Regulation No 96 of 2019 states that Vulnerable Populations are as follows:

- a. Residents Victims of Natural Disasters;
- b. Residents Victims of Social Disaster ;
- c. Displaced Persons (such as homeless people outside of number a and b)
- d. Remote Community (such as Indigenous people: Anak Rimba, Baduy Dalam, etc)

Data collection and issuance of Population Documents for Vulnerable Populations as referred, is carried out by visiting designated places which include at least:

- a. Orphanage,
- b. Nursing home,
- c. Social homes,
- d. Mental hospital,
- e. Prison,
- f. other shelters.

**We are currently in the process of improving the completeness of death and birth registration.
Efforts also include reaching out to vulnerable populations**
