- * Establishing a vision and mission for CRVS (session 10)
 - What do we want our system to look like?
- Evaluation of the current system
 - What can the current system do and where are the shortcomings? (Session 12)
 - Identifying current procedures and practices (Session 13)
 - **Identify issues** (Session 14)
- Setting priorities (Session 14)
- * Establishing national targets (Session 17)
- Sum everything up to make a plan, set timelines, responsibilities etc. (Session 18)
- Make sure everyone else supports the plan and resources are available (Session 19)
- Strategy review and monitoring of outcomes

Problems, opportunities, strategy development -examples

Internal Weaknesses	Internal Strengths	(Resulting) Strategy
No linkages with Statistics Office	National and civil registration organically linked	Formalize linkages through legislation or policy
Coding causes of death	Qualified personnel ICT infrastructure in place	Automate the coding of causes of death Train civil registration staff in coding of death
Some civil registration offices are far away from people or citizens	Mobile registration in place	Expand mobile infrastructure to remote areas
Separate forms are used by Ministry of Health and civil registration for causes of death	Strong linkages between civil registration and Ministry of Health	Formalize linkages through legislation or policy

Criteria for prioritization and scores

Urgency	4	Must start immediately

	1	Requires change in tradition, culture or policy

	3	Can be funded within current budget
